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PRESIDENT'S NOTES by Vice President Bob Covalucci, USA Ret.

Well, if you did not attend our April Dinner you not only missed a great night but also missed a terrific

presentation by Mayor Rick on what is happening in Sierra Vista. Mayor Rick pointed out that the new hospital will be a very special resource to the community and will provide a Level III Trauma Center in Cochise County.

Let's discuss the Heliogram. I am told this issue has been discussed in the past, but I felt an obligation to address limiting our delivery of the Heliogram to you by EMail, only. Last year we spent almost \$1,700 in the publication of 9 editions of the Heliogram. This money can be used to sponsor additional scholarships or trips for WWII veterans to Washington or to make donations to other worthy charitable organizations or programs in our community. VETERANS LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS by Gene Fenstermacher, Col, USAF (Ret)

On 23 April, the House Armed Services Personnel Subcommittee (HASC-P) released their mark-up of H.R. 1735, the FY 2016 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). Thankfully, none of DoD's proposals to cut pay and benefits were included.

The subcommittee rejected DoD's request to reduce the commissary subsidy that would have led to reduced hours and operating days. Before making changes to the commissary system, subcommittee members are waiting for a congressionally mandated study on the effects of price markups in commissaries, which is due in September.

Although the subcommittee rejected the DoD's budget driven proposals, it did include some controversial aspects of the Military Compensation and Retirement Modernization Commission's (MCRMC) proposals to overhaul military retirement.

It seeks to overhaul the military retirement system by October 2017. **However, current servicemembers will be able to opt-in to the new system, and existing retirees will not be affected.**

The MCRMC retirement overhaul combines the existing defined benefit with a transportable defined contribution plan that calls for Servicemembers to contribute to a portable Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) account, with a government-matching and government-contribution program.

Of the MCRMC's 15 proposed recommendations, the subcommittee addressed 11 of them. What was not included in the subcommittee mark were several sweeping recommendations made by the MCRMC, including phasing-out the TRICARE health system in favor of subsidized commercial insurance plans, an additional expensive option for survivors benefits, and the merging of commissary and exchange services.

The subcommittee's embrace of the new retirement proposal came as a surprise to some observers. The administration has yet to release its perspective on the MCRMC report, but is expected to respond by early May.

However, there is some silver lining to all this news. The HASC-P rejected the recommendation to stop contributions after 20 years of service. Even so, there are concerns that this proposal will not retain the skilled, mid-grade NCOs and officers our country needs in the long-run,

Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman John McCain looks poised to accept the House's version of retirement reform. "We've been working closely" with the House, McCain said. "We're basing our plan on the recommendations of the commission and we feel comfortable with that."

However, this is just the beginning of the FY 2016 defense bill legislative process, and we will continue to track the process as it moves to the Senate.

Training:

During this period, was able to participate in an overview training session on Transition

Liaison from the National Level view. It was quite informative. Made the slides available to each of the Transition Liaison Coordinators from the perspective of providing training later in the year.

Job Postings:

This past month, there were **71 new opportunities** posted. Of these **71 positions, 40 positions were within Cochise County (Benson, Bisbee, County, Douglas, and Sierra Vista), 5 positions at Fort Huachuca, 16 positions posted with the Sierra Vista Regional Hospital, 5 Judicial, and 5 positions within the Phoenix/Chandler/Tempe/Glendale/Scottsdale/Yavapa County Areas.** Many of these positions are for high level management and engineering there were no new jobs overseas.

Job Fairs:

There were **5 job fairs posted** this past period; **1 for the Phoenix area, 2 in Sierra Vista, 1 for Tempe, and 1 for Douglas.**

Employer Support to the Guard and Reserves (ESGR)

Presented one Patriotic Employer Award for the Benson Hospital on Friday 20 March. Additionally participated in an ESGR Employer Management Planning Session similar to MOAA's Storm the Hill concept. This ties to the budget process whereby ESGR gains funding authorization from Congress for the next year.

In addition, provided information at two job fairs on ESGR and the rights and responsibilities of the service member and employer under the United Services Employment and Reemployment Rights Act (USERRA) to include notification timetables.

HONOR FLIGHT AWARDEES

Our MOAA chapter received a gracious thank you note from Southern Arizona Honor Flights thanking us for donating \$2175. This money was used to send two Cochise County WW II veterans to visit the WW II Memorial in on the mall in our nation's capitol. They traveled on April 18-20. The two veterans were: Lewis E. Leininger and Gay D. Pilcher.



Lewis Leininger served in the U.S. Navy from 1940 until 1946. Most of the time was a member of the crew of the USS North Carolina (BB-55). His ship was part of the Pacific Fleet's "island hopping" campaign against the Japanese. The USS North Carolina assisted in amphibious landings at Guadalcanal and Tulagi and provided carrier escort duty for the USS Wasp, the USS Saratoga, and the USS Enterprise. Lewis was on the deck when the Japanese torpedoed both the USS Wasp and the USS North Carolina, killing five of his fellow sailors and ripping a huge hole in the ship. He subsequently served aboard the USS Crescent City and USS General E.T. Collins. After the war, Lewis worked as a personnel director for a food producer. He later managed a plant that made french fries and was the

President of Harvester Manufacturing when he retired. He lives in Sierra Vista and has a large family.



Gay Pilcher was in the U. S. Army from 1946-1949. He was assigned to the 88th Infantry Div. (351st Reg.) and stationed in Northern Italy on occupation duty after VE Day, guarding the border with Yugoslavia. The 351st later served as the main component of a garrison command in the Free Territory of Trieste, securing the disputed border. The command served as the front line in the Cold War from 1947 to 1954. It's duty included confrontations with the Yugoslavian Forces. After leaving military service, Gay worked for B.F. Goodrich in Thornton, GA. He later moved to Yuma to work for a cotton company and came to Bisbee for a 31 year-long banking career. He also has a large family.

A GREAT NEW HOSPITAL by Terrie Gent, Col, USAF Ret

By the time you read this, the new Canyon Vista Medical Center will be open. If you haven't been inside, please stop in to take a look at this beautiful, state of the art facility. It's part of a complex of buildings where a wide variety of medical services will be available. You'll find the hospital at 5750 E. Highway 90, in Sierra Vista.

My first impression when entering the new building was that it didn't look like a hospital. It has the welcoming feel of a very nice hotel. Part of that comes from the fact that there are over 350 pieces of locally created art throughout the building, including in the patient rooms. The hospital will have 100 beds. All rooms are "private", with only one patient per room. Each has furniture that will allow a family member to spend the night if they choose to do so. The 14 labor and delivery rooms look like very large and comfortable hospital rooms where moms can give birth in spacious and welcoming surroundings. Skillfully hidden medical equipment and supplies in each of the labor and delivery rooms will allow care givers to provide excellent care for new moms and babies all in the same room.

The hospital will have some additional new capabilities as well. Canyon View will have a cardiac receiving center with 24 x 7 cardiac intervention services. They also expect to get a Level 3 trauma designation soon. The Emergency Department will have 12 beds, each in private room. The ER department is configured to allow better care for multi-patient traumas, like a bad car or bus accident. There will be two helicopter landing pads, not just one as we had in the old hospital. This will allow a second helicopter to land if one is already on the helipad. New procedures will allow folks to get triaged faster with registration taking place in a hospital room, not in a lobby area. The operating room design also makes procedures easier for the staff because the operating rooms will be twice the size of those in the old hospital and have great new equipment. This will allow an expansion of services that require more space, like complex joint replacements that require lots of staff. The top floor will have behavioral health services, including psychiatric care, that are so greatly needed today.

A GREAT NEW HOSPITAL (cont)

The overall design of the hospital allows for more state of the art care. Each floor has a central desk where folks will be able to help you find your way around no matter when you are in the building. One of the areas where patients will notice a very big change is with electronic charting. There will be a computer in each room and in a small kiosk outside each room where the staff can keep information up to date. The floor design is also better. Hallways are placed so that staff will be able to move around behind the scenes so they don't have to move so many patients or equipment through corridors. I understand there is even a sterile corridor to facilitate physician and provider movement between the outpatient and inpatient operating rooms.

Given our druthers, none of us wants to go to an emergency room or a hospital. But isn't it great to know that in our corner of Arizona, we have a terrific new medical center.

SOME HELPFUL HINTS

WWII PBY's for Britain

The following article was sent to me by a friend, Bob Glick (a Veteran) of Fort Worth, Texas:

“This photo was taken on Lake Worth at the north end of Ft. Worth. It features some of the 200 Consolidated PBY maritime aircraft being ferried to England during early WW-II.

A large Army Air Corp. (later U.S. Air Force) base was constructed adjacent to this lake. The base became Carswell Air Force Base, a former SAC B-36, B-47 and B-52 base.

Carswell has now become JRB (joint reserve base) Ft. Worth. The Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines all maintain flight components at the facility.

November 1940 lay over point of seaplanes from San Diego to Britain at Lake Worth, Fort Worth, Texas



In November 1940, Consolidated Aircraft contacted Amon Carter, a civic leader in Fort Worth, explaining they had been ordered to transfer 200 PBY seaplanes from San Diego to Britain and that they were in immediate need of a layover point mid-country.

In just eight days, Amon Carter, with the help of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, arranged for all the necessary requirements of fuel, food, lodging for the flight crews, and moorings for the planes. To keep the mission secret, the public was told the planes were here to weather out a hurricane in the Gulf of Mexico. The rapid response from Carter and the Chamber of Commerce played a large role in convincing Consolidated Aircraft to build their manufacturing facility in Fort Worth, Texas."

- - - - - Added comment - - - - -

During the 1920s and 1930s, Carter personified the image of the Texas cowboy in the national mind: an uninhibited story-teller, gambler, and drinker, generous with his money and quick to draw his six-shooters. Major magazines such as *Time* and the *Saturday Evening Post* ran profiles of Carter. The well-publicized hospitality of his Shady Oak Farm near Lake Worth was open to any major celebrity or businessman passing through Fort Worth. Carter used his national stage to drum up business and government spending for his home region. From the Texas state legislature, he got a four-year college (now Texas Tech University) for Lubbock, where he was first chairman of the Board of Directors. Several oil companies moved or kept their headquarters in Fort Worth after personal interventions by Carter.
