VETERANS LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS by Gene Fenstermacher, Col, USAF (Ret)

By now you have probably noticed (if you weren't already aware) that you received no 2016 COLA in your Social Security, Retired Pay, SBP, DIC,

and other benefits.

But unless you fall in the so-called 'Hold Harmless' provisions of the law related to the zero COLA for 2016 (those with taxable income of \$85,000 or less for individuals and \$170,000 or less for couples and pay your premiums through deduction from your Social Security benefit), you are seeing significant increases in your Medicare Part-B premiums. For more detail, see the December Heliogram.

And higher drug co-pays have gone into effect. **The co-pay for a of 30-day supply of generic drugs at retail pharmacies** has risen from \$8 to \$10, brand-name drugs have risen from \$16 to \$20 and co-pays for medication not on the Tricare formulary have risen from \$46 to \$49.. **The co-pay for a 90-day supply of brand name drugs by mail (Express Scripts)** have risen from \$16 to \$20, and medication not on the Tricare formulary have risen from \$46 to \$49. However, a 90-day supply of Generic drugs is still available at no co-pay or mailing cost through the Express Scripts mail order program.

2015 saw the biggest changes to the military retirement system in a generation. While the changes largely will affect only new recruits in 2018 and later years, Congress approved a major overhaul to military retirement in this year's defense bill, cutting their future retired pay by 20 percent and urging military personnel to help fund their own retirement via Thrift Savings Plan accounts, i.e.; 20 year retirement would be cut from 50% of base pay to 40% of base pay and 30 year retirement would be cut from 75% of base pay to 60% of base pay.

And opportunities for investing in Thrift Savings Plans are provided with some government matching contributions.

AND WHAT ELSE IS AHEAD FOR 2016?

2016 is already shaping up to be the year where every military beneficiary - past, present, and future - could see dramatic changes to their health care benefits. Armed Services Committee leaders already tipped their hand in this year's Defense Authorization Act, where language in a 2016 Defense Authorization Conference Report indicates that nothing about the current system will be sacrosanct when lawmakers examine TRICARE in 2016.

Proposals earlier this year, that will likely be revisited, recommended scrapping TRICARE altogether, forcing beneficiaries into plans similar to those of federal civilians, imposing significantly higher fees, and means-testing TRICARE and TRICARE For Life (TFL) benefits so beneficiaries with higher incomes would pay even more. All of those and others could be on the table again in 2016.

For those interested, the Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF) reached their \$1,000,000 annual cap on 1 December, thanks to those of you who supported this effort throughout the year!

Those Scam Phone Calls

One way to reduce those annoying telephone calls that claim you won something, like a trip to the Caribbean; that you owe back taxes; that your credit card is o.k. for now, but . . . ; that your computer needs updates; and so on, is to put your telephone number(s) on the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Do-Not-Call list. It protects home and cell phone numbers from unwanted solicitations. Once you have done that, it will be unlawful for callers to make solicitations to those number(s). Really good news: your number(s) will remain on the list until you remove them or discontinue service – there is no need to re-register numbers.

If you get a new number, though, don't forget to register it. You can do that, at no cost, by phone (1-888-382-1222) or by Internet, by going to www.donotcall.gov. You must call from the phone number you wish to register. Telemarketers have up to 31 days from the date that you register your telephone number to remove it from their call lists and stop calling you. What about political robot calls or polls, or calls on behalf of a charity? Those are allowed under the federal law and FCC rules. But don't hesitate to say, "Please remove my name from your list," if you prefer not to get calls these kinds of calls. I find that saying this once usually does the trick. If you get a scammy call after you are on the Do-Not-Call list, it is just best to hang up quickly. Bob and I put our phones on the list and we still get a creative variety of calls like the ones mentioned in the first paragraph.



What the consumer protection folks advise is, don't talk to the caller or press any buttons to speak to a person because that may increase the likelihood that you will get more calls. Keep your credit card, checking account, or Social Security numbers to yourself. Don't tell them to callers you don't know — even if they ask you just to “confirm” this information. Even if they are very insistent. That's a trick. Legitimate businesses don't ask you to confirm information over the phone. If something seems important, ask the caller to send written information to your home address. That way you can check it out .

If you receive a telephone solicitation that you think violates the FCC rules, you can file a complaint by phone: 1-888-CALL-FCC (1-888-225-5322). The FCC can issue warning citations and impose fines against companies violating or suspected of violating the Do-Not-Call rules. But it is hard for the FCC to act against people who are outside the U.S. or shield their identity by hiding their own telephone numbers from consumers like us. For more information you can Google Do-Not-Call list and click on the links to the Federal Communications Commission and the Federal Trade Commission.

Job Postings:

This past 30 days, there were 46 new jobs posted. Of these 46 positions, 26 positions were within Cochise County

(Benson, Bisbee, County, Douglas, and Sierra Vista) and 20 positions were external to Cochise County (Phoenix/ Chandler/Tempe/Glendale/Scottsdale/Yavapa, Casa Grande and Maricopa County Areas).

Job Fairs:

There were only 5 job fairs posted this past period; 3 for the Phoenix area, 1 for the Tucson area, and 1 at Fort Huachuca. The Tucson job fair was announced on television two days before the job fair for 1,000 new positions. We were able to get the information posted in time for personnel in Tucson to attend (did not receive the accurate head count to date from the Tucson MOAA Chapter President).

Employer Support to the Guard and Reserves (ESGR)

Continued to support the Fort Huachuca Soldier for Life (SFL) Transition Assistance Program (TAP) office for the purpose of supporting them at their transition processing sessions as well as instruction for their National Guard Annual Training with one presentation. We had one training session on 14 November for 105 Reserve and National Guard personnel. We provided instruction/information on ESGR, what services ESGR provides, and defined for them their benefits and responsibilities governed under the United Services Employment and Reemployment Act (USERRA) enacted in 1994.

Nothing new to report for the past 30 days. The Resource Fair Committee will start up in January 2016.

CUT DOWN ON DANGEROUS CHEMICALS

When you think about polishing your brass or silver so it will look good, there are a number of household products that will work as well as the chemicals on the market place. Here are some from the CHMR’s “Hazardous Materials Fact Sheet”.

Polish brass with Worcestershire Sauce.

Polish copper with a paste of vinegar & salt.

Polish silver by soaking it in an aluminum foil tray containing 1 quart warm water, 1 tsp baking soda and 1 tsp salt.

Sprinkle baking soda over entire carpet and vacuum, after 30 minutes.

Pour baking soda down garbage disposal for disposal and drain odors.

For the toilet, pour 1/2 cup chlorine bleach into the bowl: let stand for 30 minutes; scrub with long handled brush and then flush.

VA Makes Changes to Veterans Choice Program
Changes Remove Barriers and Expands Access to Care

WASHINGTON – The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) today announced a number of changes to make participation in the Veterans Choice Program easier and more convenient for Veterans who need to use it. The move, which streamlines eligibility requirements, follows feedback from Veterans along with organizations working on their behalf.

“As we implement the Veterans Choice Program, we are learning from our stakeholders what works and what needs to be refined,” said VA Secretary Robert A. McDonald. “It is our goal to do all that we can to remove barriers that separate Veterans from the care they deserve.” To date, more than 400,000 medical appointments have been scheduled since the Veterans Choice Program went into effect on November 5, 2014.

Under the old policy, a Veteran was eligible for the Veterans Choice Program if he or she met the following criteria:

- Enrolled in VA health care by 8/1/14 or able to enroll as a combat Veteran to be eligible for the Veterans Choice Program;
- Experienced unusual or excessive burden eligibility determined by geographical challenges, environmental factors or a medical condition impacting the Veteran’s ability to travel;
- Determined eligible based on the Veteran’s current residence being more than 40 miles driving distance from the closest VA medical facility.

Under the updated eligibility requirements, a Veteran is eligible for the Veterans Choice Program if he or she is enrolled in the VA health care system and meets at least one of the following criteria:

- Told by his or her local VA medical facility that they will not be able to schedule an appointment for care within 30 days of the date the Veteran’s physician determines he/she needs to be seen or within 30 days of the date the Veteran wishes to be seen if there is no specific date from his or her physician;
- Lives more than 40 miles driving distance from the closest VA medical facility with a full-time primary care physician;
- Needs to travel by air, boat or ferry to the VA medical facility closest to his/her home;
- * Faces an unusual or excessive burden in traveling to the closest VA medical facility based on geographic challenges, environmental factors, a medical condition, the nature or simplicity or frequency of the care needed and whether an attendant is needed. Staff at the Veteran’s local VA medical facility will work with him or her to determine if the Veteran is eligible for any of these reasons; or
- Lives in a State or Territory without a full-service VA medical facility which includes: Alaska, Hawaii, New Hampshire (Note: this excludes New Hampshire Veterans who live within 20 miles of the White River Junction VAMC) and the United States Territories (excluding Puerto Rico, which has a full service VA medical facility).
