
The requirement to serve as a caregiver can occur at any time in the life of a military family. Caregivers play an important role in promoting faster recovery and enhancing quality of life for ill and injured veterans. The personal impact of providing care is enormous, the physical and emotional toll can be substantial, and navigating through the policies and procedures of various government agencies can be overwhelming. Caregiving is complex and requires dedication and a strong sense of duty. It also requires one to be sharp-witted and able to research and communicate on varied topics.

Caregivers do not need to flounder, or feel alone, when looking for assistance or answers to complex questions regarding such topics as budgeting, wealth accumulation strategies, credit management, health and life insurance needs, retirement planning, basic

real estate planning and the financial transition following military service. MOAA, USAA, the Elizabeth Dole Foundation, and the PsychArmor Institute have jointly developed a program to provide military caregivers of all ranks and services access to USAA financial advisors who can assist a caregiver and the veteran's family in making important financial decisions. USAA's advisors have the skills and experience to provide military caregivers with complex topics of concern.

This program entitled Tips for Lifelong Caregiving (which can be accessed either at <https://www.moaa.org/micro/caregiver/homepage/caregiver-homepage/> or at www.moaa.org/caregiver_finance/) is focused on assisting caregivers of multiple generations with the legal and financial aspects of military caregiving. Congress Passed a 2-Year Spending Deal. So Why Are We Heading Toward a Possible Shutdown?

When lawmakers returned from their summer recess this week, one of the first things they began work on was legislation to prevent another government shutdown. With the Oct. 1 start of the fiscal year, Congress has only a few weeks to pass a series of spending bills to keep the lights on.

How can that be when the president signed a sweeping two-year budget agreement at the beginning of August?

The agreement set broad guidelines increasing the amount of money the government can spend on defense and non-defense issues. Congress still needs to appropriate the money to various agencies.

To date, the House has passed nine spending bills this year, including money for the Defense Department. However, the Senate has delayed work on its spending bills, waiting instead for the August agreement to raise spending levels above previous budget caps. Absent a new budget deal, federal agencies would be subject to automatic budget cuts, known as sequestration.

But with new top-line numbers in the budget agreements, lawmakers in each chamber must go back to the drawing board to rewrite the legislation to adhere to the new limits. Earlier this year, House lawmakers authorized \$733 billion in defense spending. The Senate's defense bill authorized \$750 billion. In July, Congress voted on a bipartisan budget deal authorizing \$738 billion.

The new budget numbers mean the House can authorize an additional \$5 billion in spending, while the Senate must trim \$12 billion from its bill.

Lawmakers are trying to decide how long the stopgap funding measure, known as a continuing resolution,

will last. Optimists expect the extension to last until Nov. 22, although some members of Congress are floating the notion of a funding bill going until Dec. 6.

A continuing resolution delays aviators from flying hours, defers vital equipment maintenance, causes cancelations to training events and exercises, and places new acquisition and military construction programs on hold.

Even a short-term continuing resolution creates personnel turbulence.

It would be disappointing for Congress to disrupt the Pentagon with another budget Band-Aid. The August spending agreement was supposed to provide defense planners with much-needed budget certainty. A continuing resolution puts servicemembers in jeopardy. Congress needs to set aside partisan differences and pass a defense appropriations bill before the start of the fiscal year.

I had to honor to present two Patriotic Employer Awards during this report period. The first one was to the CEO of the Cooper Queen Hospital in Bisbee and the second one was to a Program Manager working for KeyW in Sierra Vista.

Cochise Serving Veterans (CSV) and the Resource Fair:

Resource Fair:

Update on the last report. There were 87 Veterans who attended the Resource Fair; 65 Male and 22 Female Veterans. Of these 87 Veterans, three were self-declared homeless but only two qualified. These two Veterans were subsequently provided housing through the assistance of Primavera and Frank Real.

The After-Action Report (AAR) was submitted to the Arizona Veterans StandDown Association thereby closing out the 6th Annual Veterans Resource Fair..

Social Services Support:

The Social Services Support Committee was able to help four Veterans during this report period. They consisted of two with their utility's bills, one with back rent, and one, through referral, housing assistance.

One very interesting situation came up that will, most likely increase the number of back utility bill payments was that some of the HUD/Vash rental companies/agents no longer will include utilities in the rent. The two that we took care of this report period were a result of that change in policy leaving the veterans with a bill to pay that was not originally planned for. Will have to closely monitor.

Fort Crittenden



A forty-five-minute drive from Fort Huachuca is a marker reminding us of the tragedies of war on all levels - right down to a single family. Located a few miles west of Sonoita, Arizona, on Arizona

Highway 82, about 35 miles by car from Fort Huachuca, is a highway marker commemorating Camp Crittenden, which later became Fort Crittenden. Built in 1867 to protect American pioneers in the area during the Apache Wars, only crumbling mud walls and piles of dirt, all on private land, remain.

Driving westward along the highway through the sunlit rolling grasslands around Sonoita, it is hard to imagine the ambushes, raids, and military battles that required not only this fort but also its nearby companion, Fort Buchanan. The Fort was named after a Civil War hero, Union

Colonel (later General) Thomas L. Crittenden, the commander of the 32nd Infantry. Having driven past this little monument many times, one evening I decided to do a little research into the man after whom it was named.

I found a bittersweet story that was typical of the civil war. A son the seventeenth governor of Kentucky, Thomas L. Crittenden joined the war effort in support of the Union. His father also remained loyal to the Union, but sadly to the family, and after many hours pleading for him to do otherwise, his brother chose to fight with the Confederate Army.

General Crittenden survived the war after commanding troops in the battles of Shiloh, Stone River, and Chickamauga. He returned to his beloved state of Kentucky and to his father, who had been the 17th governor of Kentucky. He participated in government in a state and nation healing its wounds after the tragedy of our Civil War, and he retired in 1881, remembered and honored today on a small marker west of Sonoita.

The Coronado Chapter of the Military Officers Association of America (MOAA) was pleased to announce the 2019-2020 Colonel Eric R. Osborne Memorial Scholarship Program. We are looking forward to recognizing and presenting awards to another group of outstanding senior scholars in our April 16, 2020, meeting. These funds are available only as a direct result of your generosity and giving to our Scholarship Fund. Thank you for the outstanding support toward the success of our talented seniors.

In September, scholarship program announcements and application forms were sent to the principals of twelve high schools in Cochise County and also to Patagonia HS in Santa Cruz County. The scholarships are offered to high school graduating seniors for use at a community college, a university or four-year college, or a service academy. The Chapter Board of Directors again approved \$11,000 for these scholarships.

Scholarships will be awarded to the best-qualified students from among applicants whose parents,

grandparents, or legal guardians are on active duty, in an active reservist in a drill status, in National Guard, or retired from the uniformed services. Two of these scholarships will be reserved for our Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) students, one each to a student from Buena HS and Tombstone HS. Completed applications with all supporting documents must be returned and post marked on or before March 1, 2020, and in my hands by March 6, 2020.

In addition to the Coronado Chapter's Scholarship Program, the national level MOAA organization offers various educational assistance programs such as interest free loans and grants to qualified students. When we began our lives as an officer or an officer’s spouse, most of us were faced with some foreign (and often chilling) concepts. We had to think about power of attorney, will creation, war fighting, and mortality. At the same time, many of us find ourselves negotiating the roads of new and significant relationships at work and home. However, as time goes on, we get past these challenges and find ourselves gradually learning the requisite “how-to-age” education. We then find ourselves at a point of preparing for emergencies as well as known events such as our eventual Honorable Discharge from this life.

The good news is that we can prepare ourselves, and our loved ones, relatively quickly and without pain. The bad news is that it is paperwork! There is more good news! MOAA provides a fill-in-the-blank guide to assist us to organize our paperwork and information for our loved ones. The completed guide serves as a single location for recording personal data security and important data/information keeping. Use this workbook to get a handle on essential data, from basic contact information to investments, legal documents, schools, insurance policies, and much more. This inventory offers you an opportunity to organize crucial information in one compact list, that is readily accessible at your home.

This publication also takes personal planning one step further by allowing you to organize data regarding your family. Organizing — and periodically updating — pertinent data in an all-in-one workbook ensures you’ll have all your family’s important information at your fingertips. Once you’ve completed this workbook, keep its contents in a safe place. Consider using a fireproof safe and keeping copies in secure places outside your home.

The guide will become an appreciated and valuable resource for you and your loved ones if or when assistance regarding personal information becomes necessary. Because the guide is meant to be a living document, I recommend you write with a pencil in those sections that are sure to need frequent updates.

The closing point of this essay is that we all need to personally plan and prepare for the inevitable as well as the possible. That preparation should be in an easy to retrieve and read form, but not a series of stickies and loose papers in a bedroom drawer. Document collection and preparation should be completed with the knowledge (and assistance) of family members, not completed in secret.




