
Why Join MOAA

known and well-respected leader. His guidance was reassuring through many challenges produced by this pandemic. Thank you, Tom.

My primary duties as the chapter's chief executive officer, in accordance with our "Guide to Chapter Board Responsibilities," include providing oversight for meetings and Chapter administration. In this role, I will do my best to ensure compliance with chapter policies and procedures as outlined in applicable documents and references. It is my responsibility to provide guidance to chapter committees in the conduct of their area of responsibility (e.g., intent, scope, budget, etc.). I am also tasked to communicate (to the Board and Members) and support information or proposals to help the chapter achieve its mission. I am called to ensure the chapter has a well-defined leadership succession plan. This will require me to assist my fellow members to seek and identify members to join the chapter Board of Directors.

The preamble to MOAA's establishing document states: "To inculcate and stimulate love of our country and the flag; to defend the honor, integrity, and supremacy of our national government and constitution of the United States; to advocate military forces adequate to the defense of our country; to foster the integrity and prestige of the uniformed service; to foster fraternal relations between all branches of the various services from which our members are drawn; to further the education of children of service personnel; to aid personnel of the services from which our members are drawn, and their family members and survivors, in every proper and legitimate manner; and to present their rights and interests when service matters are under consideration. We unite to form the Military Officers Association of America."

MOAA's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan/Mission is our

guide for the next year. The Association's Mission is to preserve and protect earned benefits for our uniformed services, veterans, their families, and surviving spouses through: Advocacy, Leadership, Education and Advocacy.

For your information, in 2021 the Chapter goals were: 1. Support funding for a third Arizona Veterans' benefits counselor in Sierra Vista plus increase the number of benefits counselors in Arizona. 2. Support the Cochise College Small Business Development Center to provide business opportunities and education through the Veterans Business Outreach Center at Cochise College to military members and veterans in Arizona. 3. Increase the Arizona State Tax Exemption for Retired Military Personnel. Help support HB2011 and SB1157. 4. Support the UAV in helping to find ways to reduce veteran suicides in Arizona. 5. Support the UAV in supporting more resources for "Be Connected," a veteran resource network sponsored by ADVS and the Arizona Coalition for Military Families.

Your Board of Directors will lead the Chapter in meeting MOAA's Mission and our chapter goals in the coming years. In January and February, the Board of Directors will be determining our Chapter's measurable goals for 2022. I know that You know, what our local veterans and community need. So I ask, "What would you like to see the Chapter 'Do' in 2022 and beyond?" Please provide your ideas, recommendations, or wishes to your Board Members or Chapter Officers. If we do not know about a need, we will have a difficult time meeting the need.

High Value Membership

“Have you ever paused to consider the value of your MOAA membership? Not simply the member benefits you receive or even the personal value you place on being part of the organization but how it protects you and other members of the military community?”

MOAA’s mission is to preserve and protect earned benefits for our uniformed services, retirees, veterans, their families and surviving spouses through advocacy, leadership, education and service.

Your membership becomes powerful on Capitol Hill, allowing MOAA to speak with the weight of 350,000 voices. When legislators ask how many of their constituents are MOAA members, we have a highly effective answer.

The overall value of these efforts does not always come with a dollar figure but over the years, you have seen success after success in keeping military pay raises in line with civilian counterparts and keeping housing and other allowances competitive.

Seven years ago, the retiree benefits under attack in Congress – part of a “COLA minus 1%” approach we joined with fellow veterans advocates to oppose – MOAA’s efforts helped save \$83,000 for an E-7 retiring after 20 ears and \$124,000 for an O-5 by the time they turn age 62. When I’m asked what’s in it for me, I reply, “Well, for less then \$5 a month, wouldn’t you say \$124k is a reasonable return on investment of our annual membership dues?”

Here are just a few other accomplishments you have helped make happen:

- Nearly 67,000 surviving spouses saved up to \$12,000 per year thanks to the repeal of the Survivor Benefit Plan-Dependency and Indemnity Compensation offset, better known as the “widows

tax”.

- Military families have safe, healthier housing thanks to the MOAA-supported Tenant Bill of Rights and improved congressional oversight over privatized housing programs.
- TRICARE beneficiaries have seen less impact from fee hikes while maintaining continued access to high quality care.
- Guard and Reserve members have benefited from improved health care coverage and legislation, allowing many to receive retirement pay earlier because of their service on active duty.
- Dual-military families were protected from a cost savings proposal to cut BAH in half, amounting to \$17,000 for an O-5.
- Retirees with 50% VA disability have seen higher compensation.
- And the list goes on.

Stubby, the War Dog

Last year, this column focused on member biographies, giving us a peek into the past lives of many of our members. In 2022, I would

like to review the lives of a few members of the animal kingdom who have worked side by side with military personnel, protecting, serving, and saving lives. The first of these is Stubby, the War Dog.

Variously described as either a mongrel or bull terrier, Stubby wandered onto Yale Campus in New Haven, Connecticut, in October 1917. Troops at Camp Yale were preparing to deploy to France, where they would be part of the Western Front, 102nd Infantry Regiment. Smuggled aboard the ship carrying the unit to Europe, Stubby faced eviction when he was discovered but saved his spot on the vessel by smartly saluting the commander, according to legend and perhaps true.

Sgt. Stubby was responsible for increasing troop morale. Sometimes he gave an early alert to gas attacks by waking a sentry. He had a tendency to wander off but always somehow found his way back to his personal best friend, even when the troops had moved on. He may have saved a whole division once by outing a German spy and holding onto his pant leg until troops could arrive to detain him.

As the German troops withdrew, they threw hand grenades at the pursuing Allies. One of these wounded Sgt. Stubby's foreleg, which would have qualified a human for the Purple Heart, but instead, General Blackjack Pershing, Supreme Commander of the American Forces, pinned Stubby with a big gold dog-hero medal for his service.

The sergeant returned from war a hero and soon became a celebrity. During parades, he would stand proudly with his stubby little tail pointed toward the sky. He was a lifetime member of the Red Cross and the YMCA, which ensured he had a safe place to stay and three bones per day. When Stubby passed away in 1926, the New York Time obituary covered

three columns on half a page. His remains are preserved at the Smithsonian today, and he was reintroduced to yet another generation in 2018 with the animated movie, "Sgt. Stubby: An American Hero."

Do you have a graduating high school senior in your life?




