ADVOCACY IN ACTION

This year, our Director of Legislative Affairs (Merle) will be leading the Chapter's charge in national legislation through MOAA's Advocacy In Action (AiA) program. Your fellow members and the leaders of MOAA have determined the following three legislative goals will be our lead factors.

Military Pay Raise at 4.6% per the Employment Cost Index (ECI)

MOAA supports the full pay raise for all and will guard against any reductions to fund paytable overhauls.

The Richard Star Act

This bill would end an unjust offset faced by tens of thousands of combat-injured retirees who were unable to complete 20 years of service due to their combat injuries. Retired pay is for completed years of service paid by DoD, while disability compensation is for lifelong injury paid by the VA. Two different payments for two different purposes. To reduce retired pay because of a disability is an injustice.

The Stop Copay Overpay Act

This bill would reduce mental health copays that were more than doubled through military health system reforms. Mental health is increasingly important and getting attention on the Hill due to pandemic impacts and the effects of social media on children's well-being. This issue impacts currently serving families on TRICARE Select, working age retirees and their families.

Congress to Consider Appeals Process for Tier-4/Non-Covered Drugs Under TRICARE

An appeals process for TRICARE Tier4/non-covered drugs is in the works thanks to report language in the FY 2022 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) report for their version of the FY 2022 NDAA includes language directing DoD to establish an appeals process for TRICARE coverage of Tier4/non-covered drugs.

In the TRICARE pharmacy program, any prescription drug found to provide little or no clinical effectiveness over other covered drugs may be excluded from the program. These drugs are known as Tier4 (non-covered). The FY 2018 NDAA authorized DoD to exclude such drugs.

MOAA greatly appreciates the SASC's response to the call for an appeals process. Although directive report language is not legally binding, agency officials generally regard it as a congressional mandate and respond accordingly. The SASC language directed the Defense Health Agency (DHA) to establish a medical necessity and prior authorization process to allow a beneficiary to request coverage of a Tier 4 drug at the same copay or cost-share as a non-formulary drug and requested a briefing to the Senate and House Armed Services Committees on the appeals process by Feb 1.

MOAA has also worked to get a specific drug, Dexilant, reinstated to the TRICARE formulary. Even with the pending process, the efforts on Dexilant will continue given beneficiary feedback and the research on Dexilant coverage policies, which indicate TRICARE is out of step with commercial plans and other government payers.

MOAA will request an implementation update from DHA and will provide more information as soon as it is available. Thank you to the many MOAA members who shared their stories about the impact of Tier 4. Your contributions played a critical role in the MOAA advocacy efforts.

Death of Magawa, the Hero Rat

In a previous article, we looked at Stubby the War dog, who was recognized by Gen. John Pershing for his work in World War I. In this month's article, I would like to present another military hero, though this one's work came after the war to help people in worn-torn countries in their attempt to return to normal. On January 12, 2022, a landmine-sniffing rodent named Magawa, who had won a medal for heroism for his work in Cambodia, and had retired last June, died at the age of eight.

Cambodia had one of the highest casualty rates in the world from unexploded ordnance. One-third of the casualties were children, mostly boys. This presented a social and economic problem, with few boys and men available in general, which resulted in decreasing ability to cultivate land and feed poor families. It was imperative to find ways to clear the land of explosives.



Initially, land-mine-detection dogs were deployed in Cambodia. The highly-trained dogs were effective but died or retired early because of infections of parasites, such as fleas, ticks, and mosquitoes. Both governmental and private groups worked on solving this problem and found a solution in giant African rats. Since 2016, more than 500 anti-personnel mines and 350 unexploded bombs have been found in Cambodia.

Magawa's sense of smell was so good he could find landmines and signal his handler of their exact location. Highly efficient, he could search the area as big as a tennis court in 30 minutes, while a human holding a metal detector would need up to four days to do the same. So Magawa, the hero rat's death in January was a sad event. Thankfully, others have been trained to follow in his footsteps.





ARIZONA #5 IN VETERAN SUICIDES.

Despite studies that show that the *national* rates of Veteran suicide and homelessness have declined, Arizona showed **increases** in both.

First, the Veterans Administration reported in its annual update that Veteran suicides nationally decreased by 399 and the rate per 100,000 decreased 6.3 percent. In Arizona, however, both the number and rate per 100,000 increased. As a result of the national decrease and the Arizona increase, *Arizona now has the fifth highest Veteran suicide rate in the nation.* https://www.mentalhealth.va.gov/docs/data-sheets/2021/2021-National-Veteran-Suicide-Prevention-Annual-Report-FINAL-9-8-21.pdf

Further, another veterans-based study showed that 88% of Arizona's Veteran Suicides are older than 35 years of age. And the largest group is 55-74 years old.

Secondly, in its Annual Homeless Assessment Report, the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) reported that *Arizona is among just a few states where Veteran homeless rates increased* while the national rates and most of the states decreased. https://www.huduser.gov/portal/sites/default/files/pdf/2021-AHAR-Part-1.pdf.
