Director of Legislative Affairs, Merle Kilpatrick discusses the Advocacy in Action topics below. The subjects of AiA for this year are focused on three issues. Our concerns were shared at a recent meeting with Congresswoman Kirkpatrick. The meeting was attended by representatives from your Chapter, the Arizona Council of Chapters, and members of the Congresswoman's staff. We discussed; The Major Richard Star Act, The Stop Copay Overpay Act, and a 4.6% Pay raise. All three have significant impact on current and future military veterans. It was great to have Congresswoman Kirkpatrick's undivided attention.

I believe that it is critical that we, Chapter members and spouses, express our support for these and other important bills by communicating a call-to-action to our community's representatives. In Arizona, 354 individual call-to-action messages regarding AiA topics were sent to legislators. I encourage you to raise that number and log your position with our Senators and House members. This is a one stop location to help members communicate with their Congress Members and Senators in support of active service-

Our Director of Scholarship Dr. Susan Atchison-Day and her committee members organized an excellent and complete scholarship program. Committee members Tom Day, Kathy Youngblood, Jane Strain, and Bob Abney were led by Director Susan through achieving a program that is active throughout the year as an organized process (despite challenges thrown into the mix by Covid and distance). Dr. Atchison-Day managed a fair review and excellent outcome in making recommendations to reward the students identified in this Heliogram. The future of America was on display at the April Dinner Meeting. I encourage you to read the biographies of the awardees who received monetary support from you. They are very impressive and worthy of support. In this edition you will also see a photo or two of the awarding of distinguished JROTC cadets. Director of JROTC Lori Wysong personally delivers medals, ribbons, and certificates to the awardees at a ceremony at Tombstone High and Buena High. 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2022 GOAL STATEMENTS

- Support the three primary 2022 MOAA National Advocacy in Action topics through engagement with our members and appropriate elected officials.

AiA Topics for 2022

One of the topics for the 2022 Advocacy in Action (AiA) campaign is Military Pay Raise at 4.6% per the Employment Index (ECI).

MOAA's position: Support the full pay raise across all ranks.

The Bureau of Labor Statics Employment Cost Index (ECI) serves as a baseline for determining compensation necessary to recruit and retain an all-volunteer force. MOAA's concern is the president can reduce that amount with justification, and Congress can reduce that amount through legislation.

The pay raise for our troops fell 2.6% behind ECI from 2014-2016. Given the continued challenges to fund the government, no one should take this pay raise for granted; any decrement would impact the all-volunteer force in several ways:

- **Recruiting**: Word that the pay raise was cut may get the attention of recruits still weighing their options with other competitors, especially applicable to today's employment environment.
- **Retention**: Those currently in service may see this as a slight to their continued loyalty to their mission, thus informing their decision to get out before committing any more time to a system that does not value their service and sacrifice.
- **Retirement**: Those approaching retirement will feel the sting in other ways. Pay raise decrements impact the final retirement pay for the rest of their lives, and for surviving spouses under the Survivor Benefit Plan. Such actions may be a catalyst to considering retirement as early as eligible.

When we continue to give our servicemembers a reason to leave or retire early, our services lost the most qualified and experienced people first because these are the people most competitive for openings at other agencies and businesses.

Thank you for your efforts to never stop serving those who rely on us the most.

Article taken from the official history: The Origin of the Coronado Chapter MOAA

As early as March 1972, members of The Retired Officers Association (TROA), which was the original name of MOAA, who were living in the Sierra Vista area were holding meetings to discuss the formation of a local chapter. At that time there were about 200 TROA members residing in the area bounded by Douglas, Benson, Hereford, and Nogales. The only existing chapter in SE Arizona was in Tucson.

That month COL Eric R. Osborn (Ret) received a letter from TROA with an offer of financial assistance in the establishment of a "new chapter in the Fort Huachuca area." Later that year, COL Osborne attended the annual TROA convention in Washington, D.C., and soon began corresponding with COL Sidney Harris (Ret) of Tucson, TROA Regional Representative, to make final arrangements for the formation of a chapter.

According to an article appearing in the Herald Dispatch on 26 January 1973, "A group of retired officers met on 18 January to form a local chapter of the Retired Officers Association. The name 'Coronado' was selected for the chapter as it will seek members who reside in Cochise and Santa Cruz counties, an area explored by Coronado" At this meeting an initial board for the chapter was named. It was announced that the chapter would hold a general organizational meeting the following month on 15 February.

At that ensuing meeting, held at the Lakeside Club, an election was held during which six persons were elected to the executive board and nine were elected to the board of governors. Those elected were from Sierra Vista, Hereford, Bisbee, Douglas, Sunsites, Tombstone, and Nogales. Fifty-nine persons attended that meeting, which included a buffet dinner costing \$3.50 per person.

Following that meeting, COL Osborne sent a letter dated 21 February to TROA, to which was attached "a signed copy of the Constitution and By-Laws, the list of elected chapter officers. The latter list comprises the 'Charter Members' – those who had signed up by the time of the diner meeting." The list contained the names of 47 retired members of TROA and one widow.

At the next meeting held on 15 March at the Lakeside Club the chapter's charter was presented by a representative of national headquarters and was signed by all members present. There are 34 signatures on the charter. As reported in the 22 March Issue of *The Huachuca SCOUT, "It's official. The Coronado chapter of The Retired Officers Association (TROA) now has its charter."*

Complete Information on 2022 MOAA Scholarship Winners

Recipients of the 2022 Colonel Eric R. Osborne Memorial Scholarships all expressed their gratitude to the many generous members of the Coronado Chapter MOAA. We were able to award \$12,000 in scholarships for the 2021 – 2022 school year to qualifying graduating seniors. Two of these scholarships were awarded to graduating seniors enrolled in the JROTC Programs at Buena High School and/or Tombstone High School.

Our winners are as follows:



Gabryella Dickey, Benson HS Awarded \$3000

Gabryella is accepted at Cochise College, where she hopes to study nursing or radiology. Daughter of a retired Marine Helicopter Pilot, she, too, hopes to follow in her father's footsteps with a career in the military. She has completed courses, such as Agri-Science, Honors Pre-calc, Spanish, and Applied Biological Science. In recommendations, she is described as having drive, determination, resilience, and high morals, keeping good company, treating others well and going over and beyond what is required, smart, compassionate, and a positive role model.

Gabryella has been FFA President, Link President, NHS Historian, FFA Chapter Reporter, Grand Champion Showman (hard work and poise) and Judge, Food Pantry worker, and, Kennel Assistant. Her community Service includes activities, such as a food packaging conference, fair clean up, help with Los Charros Community Dinner, help with Veterans Day, and the community food bank, and writing thank you cards. Non-Scholastic Awards in Beef and Goat Showmanship - four Grand Championships, a Reserve Championship, and a National Bronze Team Livestock Judging.

After military service, she wants to settle down and start her own herd of high-quality Club Calves and donate them to kids who couldn't necessarily afford the higher quality cattle. She wants to offer this opportunity to others because, "showing cattle changed my life."





Nahrin Adams, Buena HS Awarded \$2000

Nahrin is variously described as a problem solver, model student, and inspiration to others, who is flexible, mature, hardworking, capable, dedicated, and well rounded. Because of her positive attitude, drive, and perseverance, one teacher described her as being an inspiration even to her herself.

In addition to maintaining a GPA of 4.0 in both HS and Elementary School, Nahrin participated in service projects in her family, church, and community, helping to gather wood, cut down weeds, painting and babysitting. Prior to high school, Nahrin participated in cross country for four years, track and field for five years, and JNHS for three years. She continued her interest in sports in HS, as a swimmer for four years, a tennis player for one year and was the Vice President of tennis, also.

Nahrin took courses in Honors Algebra and Honors Geometry, Choir, and Spanish, and was active in church, her roles including those of historian, counselor in young women' group, director of choirs, and secretary.




Megan Izzo, Tombstone HS, JROTC (Top in JROTC Class)
Awarded \$3000

Megan is described as a role model - cooperative, giving, and intelligent, with a clear sense of purpose. She is methodical, organized, cool, logical, rational, clear mind and can be trusted to give her full effort, completing work in a timely manner.

She has served as NHS President, and Future Business Leaders, President. She was in FFA, varsity tennis team, National Society of HS Scholars, and Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership. She helped with Summer Splash and Operation Christmas Child. She won 2nd place in Earth and Space Science category at YES Fair; the Scottish-American Military Medal; George C. Marshall Leadership and Academic Award; Certification for Graphic Arts and Law and Public Safety. She also participated in other school and community events.

In JROTC, she was selected as S-1 and participated in JROTC Leadership and Academic Bowl (JLAB). She was the rifle team commander and also competed in rifle meets. Additionally, finished Platinum in Cyber Patriot competition, which challenges teams of high school students to find and fix cybersecurity vulnerabilities in virtual operating systems, and for which teams are scored on how secure they make the system. Megan's future goal is to study Robotics and Embedded Systems at the University of Advancing Technologies in the fall, then after getting a BA, she will look for a good job, where her knowledge and zeal will make her competitive and in demand.





Mhikyle Joy Cruz, Buena HS, JROTC Awarded \$4000

Mhikyle succeeded in a large number of difficult classes, honors Geometry, English, Biology, Algebra, Pre-calc, and Trigonometry. In addition, she was a member of the NHS three years, and participated in over 50 hours of community service, including organizing and running a blood drive. She would like to major in engineering or mathematics while also being part of the Air Force ROTC at NAU or the UA. After this, she hopes to join the Air Force as an Officer and earn an MA or PhD after this. She stated that her main goal is "to make my family proud".

Mhikyle served as JROTC Command Sergeant Major, and Lieutenant Colonel of the Fighting Colt Battalion. As such, she manages, trains, supervises First Sergeants, commanders, staff members and the whole battalion. She works alongside JROTC instructors in carrying out policies and standards on the performance, training, appearance, and conduct of cadets.

In addition to all this, her work experience includes Chili's, as hostess, where she provided hospitable and customized service to improve guests experience. She has also earned four Varsity Letters for Wrestling, competing in AIA and State Wrestling; she was captain of the Varsity Girls' Team for three of these years. Mhikyle's other interests include traveling and baking. She has been accepted at NAU, MA, and ASU.

Eligibility criteria were: (1) the applicant's parent, grandparent, or legal guardian must be active duty military, retired military (20+ years), an active reservist in drill status, or National Guard Member; (2) applicant must have an overall academic GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale; (3) applicant must be a 2020 Graduating Senior from one of the following high schools: Benson, Bisbee, Bowie, Buena, Douglas, Patagonia, San Simon, St. David, Tombstone, Valley Union, Wilcox, a certified Charter High School or a certified Home School Program in the geographic area covered by these high schools; (4) the applicant must enroll in a community college, a college, a university, or military/service academy. Each scholarship recipient submitted required application materials and participated in an interview with the MOAA Scholarship Committee.

Strain, USA (Ret.), M.A., Educational Psychology, University of Arizona - Flinn-Brown Fellow, Cochise Community College, Governing Board Trustee; and COL Robert Abney, USA (Ret.), B.S., Accounting Eastern Michigan University, and MBA, Webster University.


