New Suicide Prevention Effort

How Members of MOAA Can Assist

"While congress works on legislation likely to result in reduced end strength for our overstretches forces, a new commission will work to offer lawmakers much needed insight into the continuing suicide crisis – a problem amplified by disturbing reports regarding military mental health care.

Last year, Congress directed DoD to form a Suicide Prevention and Response Independent Review Committee (SPRIRC). Tasked with offering independent recommendations to address this worsening trend, the committee's 10 members will visit military installations from each service, including at least one remote location and make assessments based on focus groups, individual interviews and a confidential survey.

Suicide prevention has been studied extensively by DoD, the Government Accountability Office and medical professionals, all with ineffective results. Rates continue to move in the wrong direction and Congress wants an independent look.

The erosion of the on-installation community, unit cohesion, esprit de corps and trust in installation support to quality of life will feed into the committee's report and drive resource recommendations.

A 2020 DoD Inspector General report found access to mental health care was a major problem and provider shortages remain in the aftermath of pandemic-driven isolation and reduction in personnel protective factors such as a sense of belonging and community.

SPRIRC has asked for assistance from veterans' service organizations. Dr. Gayle Iwamasa, the VA national director for inpatient mental health services and the lead for SPRIRC, has asked a pointed question of groups like MOAA and their members: What recommendations would you give to Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin?

Send your recommendations on suicide prevention and how to improve servicemember quality of life to legis@moaa.org and put 'suicide prevention' in the subject line. Your feedback will feed into the SPRIRC."

H.R.4949 Hello Girls Congressional Gold Medal Act.

The following information is provided to inform you of a legislative action that, per recommendation of the Board of Directors, is worthy of your support by encouraging your Representative to sign on as a co-sponsor to the subject Act.

"Hello Girls" was the colloquial name for American female Signal Corps Female Telephone Operators Unit. During World War I, these switchboard operators were sworn into the U.S. Army Signal Corps in 1917 from a call by General John J. Pershing to improve the worsening state of communications on the Western front.

Applicants had to be bilingual in English and French to ensure that orders would be heard by anyone. Over 7,000 women applied, but only 223 women were accepted. They completed their Signal Corps training at Camp Franklin, now a part of Fort George G. Meade in Maryland. These bilingual female switchboard operators connected more than 150.000 calls per day during the war, doing so at a rate six times faster than their male counterparts.

The women were issued military uniforms and took the Army oath. However, the adjutant general of the United States sent an internal memo stating that the women were civilian employees, "authorized by contract and not by Army regulations". No contracts were ever prepared though. Although they wore U.S. Army Uniforms and were subject to Army Regulations, they were not given honorable discharges but were considered civilians employed by the military.

In 1977, 60 years after the first Hello Girls took the Army oath, Congress passed legislation to retroactively acknowledge the military service of the women of the U.S. Army Signal Corps.

October Scholarship Article for Heliogram

In September's Heliogram, we announced that the Chapter Board of Directors, because of your continuing support of our program, was able to approve \$12,000 for scholarships, which will be awarded in at our regular MOAA Dinner on 20 April 2023.

This month, the high schools from the following communities were notified of our scholarship requirements and timelines: Benson, Berean, Bisbee, Bowie, Douglas, Patagonia, San Simon, Sierra Vista, St. David, Tombstone, Valley Union, or Willcox, and Center for Academic Success. They received applications and announcements for all students, which have also been included in this month's Heliogram, for your own use.

Applications must be postmarked no later the 1 March 2023, are due in the Scholarship Director's possession no later than noon on 6 March 2023. We will present the winners to our membership at the dinner meeting, on 20 April 2023.

For your review, our chapter scholarships are offered to high school graduating seniors for use at a community college, a university or four-year college, a military service academy, or certified trade school.

Two of these scholarships will be awarded to the best-qualified Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) students from Buena High School and/or Tombstone High School.

Additional scholarships will be awarded to the best-qualified applicants whose parents, grandparents, or legal guardians are on active duty, are an active reservist in drill status, in the National Guard, died while serving on Active Duty, or retired from the uniformed services.

A number of Scholarships will be awarded during the 2022 - 2023 school year to eligible graduating seniors.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

- 1. The applicant must be a 2023 Graduating Senior from one of the following high schools: Benson, Bisbee, Bowie, Buena, Douglas, Patagonia, San Simon, St. David, Tombstone, Valley Union, Willcox, a certified Charter High School or a certified Home School Program in the geographic area covered by the above high schools.
- 2. The applicant's parent, grandparent, or legal guardian must be active duty military, retired (20+ year career) military, an active reservist in drill status, or National Guard Member.
- 3. The applicant must have an overall academic Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

<u>Expand Social Opportunities</u> – Coronado sponsors programs and opportunities to interact with civic, political, military, and business leaders.


